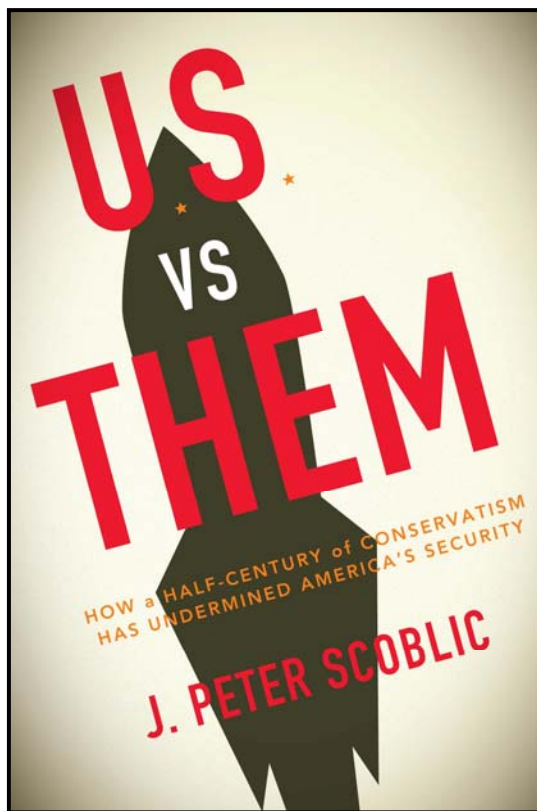

J. Peter Scoblic's *U.S. vs. THEM* (Viking; on-sale April 21, 2008; 320 pages; ISBN: 978-0-670-01882-6) is the book that finally explains the Bush administration’s foreign policy—and that shows why it still matters. Rather than simply describing Bush’s policies or articulating their

immediate causes, Scoblic identifies their true source in an ideological movement that has been with us for fifty years: American conservatism.

In the tradition of James Mann's *Rise of the Vulcans*, Scoblic traces the intellectual roots of modern conservative geopolitics—from the foundational years when William F. Buckley defined the Cold War as an apocalyptic struggle against "Satanic communism," to the right-wing campaign against the nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, to George W. Bush's "Axis of Evil." Digging through forgotten history, he shows how the Bush administration's foreign policy choices—its frequent refusal to engage in diplomacy, its obsession with missile defense, its hatred of the United Nations, even the invasion of Iraq—spring from the ideals of Barry Goldwater and *National Review*, and how they prevent the United States from addressing the twenty-first century's greatest security threat: nuclear terrorism.

Scoblic shows that American conservatism is locked into a binary setting—an insistence on seeing the world in terms of good versus evil, or us versus them—that transposes an eighteenth-century view of America's global role onto a modern battle against transnational threats. While this insistence on "moral clarity" helps win elections, it has endangered the United States because it leads conservatives to embrace nationalistic solutions to problems, like proliferation, that can be solved only through international cooperation.

Bush may leave office next year, but conservatism is firmly embedded in the politics of the Republican Party, including those of John McCain. In this contentious election year, *U.S. vs. Them* provides an eye-opening insight into how conservative ideas have undermined our safety—and how different ideas can restore America's place in the world.
